# **Suggested Self-Guided Tour Routes**

Maximize your time in the Village by following one of these themed routes with your students. The numbers next to the location indicate where to find each place on your map. Make sure to ask lots of questions, and have fun!



## **Animals and Agriculture**

After crossing the bridge into the Village, turn left towards the Countryside. This route will take you on a loop through the Countryside and into the Center Village.
